

A Dragon and His Boy:
The Narnian Justification of Eustace Clarence Scrubb

Perhaps nowhere else in his writing does C. S. Lewis present a clearer conversion than he does with the dramatic un-dragoning of Eustace in *The Voyage of the "Dawn Treader."* In this talk, Andrew Lazo will explore the roots of Eustace's particular nastiness and how he came to shed his skin and "began to be a different boy." Andrew will also trace the implications of conversion, both upon Lewis's life and potentially upon our own.

In C. S. Lewis's *The Voyage of the "Dawn Treader"* we find a fascination shift enacted. Lucy Pevensie, the child closest to Aslan in all the Narnia Chronicles, undergoes sore temptation and fails fairly spectacularly. Her brother Edmund, however, continues his steady progress as he successfully struggles to live in the reality of his redemption, accomplished by Aslan's sacrifice. Andrew Lazo will demonstrate in the lives of these two characters the encouraging effects of the children's lives in ways that can spur our own spiritual growth.
